

“Alice Paul: The Quaker Fights for Equality”

Recognizing National Woman’s History Month



Meet Alice Paul live and in-person – one of the leading suffragettes of the 20th century.

Against many odds, her tireless leadership and influence led to the passage of the 19th Amendment. Hear her story of determination, struggle, sacrifice and success in her fight for woman’s equality.



Considered a “militant” and accused by many of being “unpatriotic” during World War I, Paul’s tireless efforts to secure the enfranchisement of woman often put her at odds with leaders and followers of the women’s movement. Her formation of the *National Women’s Party* (a break-off group of the *National American Woman Suffrage Association*) **led the charge to pass the 19th Amendment in 1920.** Well educated and considered one of the finest orators of her time, Paul unapologetically broke the rules to get things done.
