



## 18th Century Pennypack Creek Mills

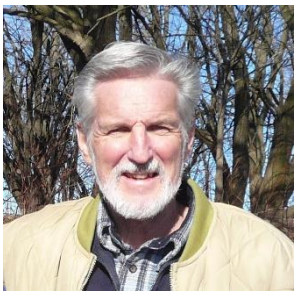

The 1759 Nicholas Scull Map of Pennsylvania places 13 mills on Pennypack Creek - as many as are shown on Wissahickon Creek.

Local historian Fred Moore will concentrate on these Pennypack Creek mills in his discussion of industry on Pennypack Creek in the 18<sup>th</sup> century. One such mill is the Dungworth Mill (also known as the Pennypack Mill) still standing in Hatboro. Constructed circa 1720, it has been standing since near the founding of Hatboro and is the borough's oldest structure.

### About the presenter, Fred Moore



Fred Moore is with the Friends of Northeast Philadelphia History. His interest in Northeast Philly history centers on Pennypack Creek. He lived near the creek in Holmesburg for 42 years before moving 12 years ago to Huntington Valley. Fred is also an active member in The Millbrook Society and led several book-publishing projects, including Millbrook's most recent publication, *Hatboro Then & Now* (2021).
